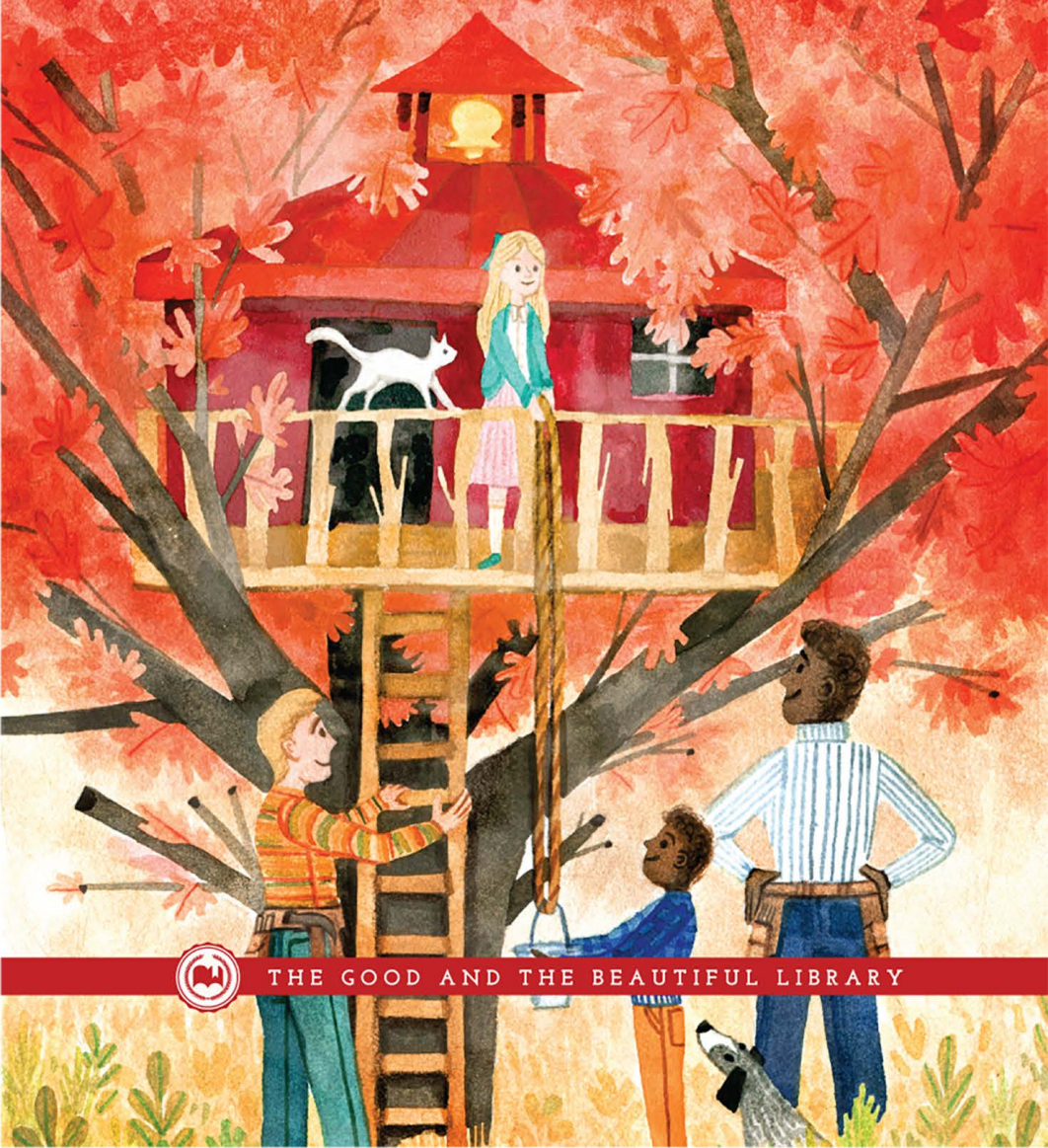

Instructions

Deal both players two cards. The first player spins the spinner and decides if one of their cards matches the part of speech indicated on the spinner.

If it matches, the player claims the matching color house, discards the card, and draws a new card from the pile. It is now the other players turn.

If none of the cards matches the part of speech on the spinner, the player choose one of his or her cards to discard and picks up a new card from the pile. It is now the other players turn.

Instructions Cont.

Repeat until one player has all 4 houses (1 of each color). Players can not claim two houses of the same color. If you run out of cards flip over the discard pile and continue.
