# YEAR 1 HISTORY READ-ALOUD SUGGESTIONS =

As part of the course, you may wish to select and read four books to your child(ren), one to go along with each of the four units in the course. It is recommended that you read for at least 20 minutes at the end of each lesson. However, to finish most books by the end of the unit, a longer reading time will be required. Some parents choose to do history lessons twice a week but the read-aloud book more often.

### **UNIT 1 SUGGESTED READ-ALOUD BOOKS**

#### All Ages (Grades 3-8)

1. Boy of the Pyramids by Ruth Fosdick Jones

Kaffe, the 10-year-old son of a wealthy Egyptian nobleman, has fourteen copper rings to spend at the bustling Memphis market. He hopes to buy a dagger of his own but instead makes a choice that will alter his life forever. Through thrilling experiences at the harvest feast, bullfight, and annual flood, ancient Egypt comes to life. His greatest test awaits as he works to unravel the mystery of the pyramid.

2. The Bronze Bow by Elizabeth George Speare

This novel is set in 1st-century Galilee during the time of Jesus. It follows Daniel, a boy consumed by hatred for the Romans after his father's death. His perspective begins to shift when he reconnects with old friends and returns home to care for his sister, Leah. Through these relationships and the teachings of Jesus, Daniel learns to let go of vengeance and embrace love and forgiveness.

#### Intermediate Ages and Older (Grades 7-8)

# 1. *The Pharaohs of Ancient Egypt* by Elizabeth Payne

This book delves into the lives of powerful pharaohs, their reigns, and their lasting impacts on ancient Egyptian culture. From the construction of monumental pyramids to the rise and fall of legendary rulers like Ramses the Great and Tutankhamun, the author provides an insightful look into the world of the pharaohs. With detailed and informative storytelling, this book offers a great introduction to the history and legacy of ancient Egypt.

#### 2. The Cat of Bubastes by G.A. Henty

A historical adventure novel set in ancient Egypt, following Amuba, a young prince from a conquered land who is taken as a slave. He serves the Egyptian high priest's family and befriends Chebron, the priest's son, but their lives take a dangerous turn when Chebron accidentally causes the death of a sacred cat. Forced to flee, they embark on a perilous journey filled with excitement, battles, and survival. The story explores themes of friendship, courage, and faith against the backdrop of ancient Egyptian customs and conflicts.

# 3. *The Riddle of the Rosetta Stone* by James Cross Giblin

This 75-page book tells of the discovery and translation of the Rosetta Stone. This fantastic book is well written and easy enough for children eight and older to understand (as a read-aloud) while still being informative and engaging even for adults. The book features large print and great illustrations and images. Note for parents: The Rosetta Stone is a topic in one of the stories in **The Big Book of History Stories-Year 1**. We recommend this resource for additional in-depth learning.

#### 4. God King: A Story in the Days of King Hezekiah by Joanne Williamson

This is a historical novel set in ancient Egypt and Israel. It follows Prince Taharka, the young pharaoh of Egypt, who is forced to flee his own kingdom when political betrayal threatens his life. Seeking refuge in Israel, he becomes entangled in King Hezekiah's struggle against the powerful Assyrian Empire. Through his journey, Taharka discovers the true source of strength and leadership, as the story explores themes of faith, destiny, and courage.

### 5. *Mara, Daughter of the Nile* by Eloise Jarvis McGraw

This story takes place in ancient Egypt, following Mara, a clever and resourceful slave who longs for freedom. She becomes a double spy, working for both the rebellious forces supporting Thutmose III and the powerful Queen Hatshepsut. As she navigates a world of danger, deception, and political unrest, she must decide where her true loyalties lie. 6. The Golden Goblet by Eloise Jarvis McGraw

Ranofer, an orphaned boy and goldsmith's porter in the ancient Egyptian city of Thebes, has discovered a thief. But it isn't just any thief, it's someone he knows well. His discovery leads him on a suspenseful journey to thwart the evil plans of the thief. Readers are not only left with greater knowledge about ancient Egypt but also with messages about working through trials, friendship, hard work, and courage. Note: The main character suffers physical and verbal abuse by his brother, which may be difficult for some children.

### **UNIT 2 SUGGESTED READ-ALOUD BOOKS**

#### All Ages (Grades 3-8)

1. The Saracen Steed by Arthur Anthony Gladd

When a simple farm boy befriends a mysterious horse near Abbey St. Simon, he never imagines

the adventures that await him. As Christendom hangs in the balance, young Hugh embarks on a daring mission to save his people from the Saracens. Against all odds, he proves his courage with the help of one of their own majestic steeds. Set during the Crusades, this uplifting tale blends history, heroism, and moral depth without relying on graphic details.

#### 2. The Door in the Wall by Marguerite de Angeli

This novel tells the story of Robin, a young boy in medieval England who is crippled by a fever and confined to a room in a castle. Despite his disability, Robin is determined to live a life of purpose, and with the encouragement of his loyal servants, he learns to adapt and grow. As he faces challenges and adventures, Robin discovers his inner strength and courage. The novel explores themes of perseverance, independence, and overcoming adversity.

#### 3. Huguenot Garden by Douglas M. Jones III

Set in La Rochelle, France, in 1865, this historical children's novel follows the lives of young twin sisters and their French Protestant family. #### Older Children Only (Grades 7-8)

It explores her visions and divine guidance, which inspired her to stand up against the English invaders.
